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## CHAPTER \_\_\_\_\_

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Task Force on the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect**

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Task Force on the Prevention of Child Abuse and  
4 Neglect; providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the Task Force;  
5 prohibiting a member of the Task Force from receiving certain compensation, but  
6 authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the Task Force to  
7 study and make recommendations regarding certain matters; requiring the Task  
8 Force to report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the General  
9 Assembly on or before a certain date; providing for the termination of this Act; and  
10 generally relating to child abuse and neglect.

11 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,  
12 That:

13 (a) There is a Task Force on the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect.

14 (b) The Task Force consists of the following members:

15 (1) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of  
16 the Senate;

17 (2) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of the  
18 House;

- 6 (6) one representative of the Governor's Office for Children; and
- 7 (7) the following members, appointed by the Governor:
- 8 (i) one representative of the Governor's Office of Crime Control and  
9 Prevention;
- 10 (ii) one representative of the State Council on Child Abuse and  
11 Neglect;
- 12 (iii) one representative of the Maryland Court–Appointed Special  
13 Advocate Program;
- 14 (iv) one representative of nonpublic school employees with expertise  
15 regarding the current operations and training practices within nonpublic schools on the  
16 prevention, identification, and reporting of child abuse and neglect;
- 17 (v) one representative of public school employees with expertise  
18 regarding the current operations and training practices within public schools on the  
19 prevention, identification, and reporting of child abuse and neglect;
- 20 ~~(vi)~~ (vi) one representative of the Maryland Coalition Against  
21 Sexual Assault;
- 22 ~~(vii)~~ (vii) one representative of Maryland Child Abuse Medical  
23 Providers or the Maryland Psychological Association;
- 24 ~~(viii)~~ (viii) one representative of the Maryland Children's Alliance;
- 25 ~~(ix)~~ (ix) one representative of an organization representing law  
26 enforcement;
- 27 ~~(x)~~ (x) one representative of the Maryland chapter of the  
28 National Association of Social Workers;
- 29 ~~(xi)~~ (xi) one representative of the Maryland Clinical Social Work  
30 Coalition;

1                   ~~(xi)~~ (xii)       one representative of the Maryland State's Attorneys'  
2 Association; ~~and~~

3                   (xiii)       one child psychiatrist who is active in the practice of treating  
4 childhood emotional disorders; and

5                   ~~(xii)~~ (xiv)       up to three members of the general public who are actively  
6 involved in the field of child protection.

7           (c)       The membership of the Task Force shall reasonably reflect the geographic  
8 diversity of the State.

9           (d)       The Governor shall designate the chair of the Task Force.

10          (e)       The Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention shall provide staff for  
11 the Task Force with assistance from the State Council on Child Abuse and Neglect.

12          (f)       A member of the Task Force:

13               (1)       may not receive compensation as a member of the Task Force; but

14               (2)       is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State  
15 Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget.

16          (g)       The Task Force shall:

17               (1)       hold hearings throughout the State and receive testimony from  
18 individuals, State and local agencies, community-based organizations, and other public  
19 and private organizations;

20               (2)       invite representatives from interested stakeholder groups, including  
21 child abuse survivors, caseworkers, mental health professionals, foster care providers, and  
22 representatives of religious organizations, to testify at public meetings held at various  
23 locations throughout the State;

24               (3)       study:

25                   (i)       child abuse and neglect cases throughout the State; and

26                   (ii)      best practices throughout the United States regarding laws and  
27 systems designed to protect children and prevent child abuse and neglect; and

28               (4)       make recommendations regarding:

29                   (i)       goals for State policies to prevent child abuse and neglect;

1 (ii) whether changes to the State's child abuse and neglect laws  
2 should be made, including whether criminal penalties should be established for the  
3 intentional failure to report child abuse or neglect;

4 (iii) methods for improving systems for reporting child abuse and  
5 neglect;

6 (iv) methods to foster excellence among multidisciplinary teams  
7 investigating child abuse and neglect and cooperation among State agencies and between  
8 the State and local governments that handle child abuse and neglect cases;

9 (v) methods for improving access to medical care and mental health  
10 services and treatment;

11 (vi) methods for increasing public awareness about child abuse and  
12 neglect;

13 (vii) methods for increasing funding to prevent and address childhood  
14 trauma;

15 (viii) methods for improving the training of professionals described in  
16 § 5–704 of the Family Law Article on the reporting of child abuse and neglect; and

17 (ix) methods to adopt and implement policies addressing the  
18 prevention of child abuse that may include age-appropriate curricula for students in  
19 prekindergarten through fifth grade.

20 (h) On or before December 1, 2015, the Task Force shall report its findings and  
21 recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State  
22 Government Article, the General Assembly.

23 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June  
24 1, 2015. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and 1 month and, at the end of June  
25 30, 2016, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be  
26 abrogated and of no further force and effect.
