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Public Schools - Suspensions and Expulsions

3 FOR the purpose of prohibiting the suspension or expulsion of prekindergarten, kindergarten, first grade, or second grade students from public schools except if 4 5 required by federal law; prohibiting the suspension of certain students for a certain 6 time period except under certain circumstances; requiring the principal or school 7 administration to contact a student's parent or guardian; authorizing the suspension or expulsion of students in kindergarten, first grade, or second grade under certain 8 9 circumstances; requiring the school to return a suspended student to school under a 10 eertain manner; requiring the school to provide certain supports to address the student's behavior; requiring the school system to remedy the impact of the student's 11 12 behavior through certain intervention methods; requiring the State Department of 13 Education to adopt certain regulations on or before a certain date; defining certain 14 terms; and generally relating to the suspension and expulsion of students in public 15 schools.
