## CHAPTER \_\_\_\_\_

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Audiology and Speech–Language Pathology Interstate Compact**

3 FOR the purpose of entering into the Audiology and Speech–Language Pathology Interstate  
4 Compact; stating the purpose of the Compact; requiring that a certain license issued  
5 by a home state be recognized by each member state as authorizing certain practice  
6 of audiology or speech–language pathology; requiring a state to meet certain  
7 requirements to participate in the Compact; prohibiting certain communication from  
8 including certain information; requiring a certain licensing board to take certain  
9 action on application for a privilege to practice; requiring each member state to  
10 require an applicant to obtain or retain a certain license and meet certain  
11 qualifications; requiring certain audiologists and speech–language pathologists to  
12 meet certain eligibility requirements to exercise a certain privilege; requiring an  
13 audiologist or a speech–language pathologist practicing in a member state to comply  
14 with certain laws; requiring that certain individuals be able to continue to apply for  
15 a certain license; authorizing member states to charge a certain fee; requiring  
16 member states to comply with certain bylaws, rules, and regulations; requiring  
17 certain audiologists and speech–language pathologists to apply for certain licensure;  
18 establishing the circumstances under which a license may not be issued or is  
19 required to be converted to a certain license; establishing the period during which a  
20 Compact privilege is valid; requiring certain licensees to function within certain laws  
21 and regulations; providing that certain licensees are subject to certain regulatory  
22 authority; requiring a licensee to lose the Compact privilege during a certain period  
23 under certain circumstances; requiring member states to recognize the right of an  
24 audiologist or a speech–language pathologist to practice via telehealth under certain

 2 designate a certain state as a home state and ~~authorizing~~ requiring the change of a  
 3 certain designation in a certain manner; establishing certain requirements and  
 4 certain authority of remote states and home states with regard to adverse actions;  
 5 establishing the Audiology and Speech–Language Pathology Compact Commission;  
 6 establishing the membership, powers, and duties of the Commission; establishing an  
 7 Executive Committee with authority to act on behalf of the Commission under  
 8 certain circumstances; establishing the membership, powers, and duties of the  
 9 Executive Committee; providing for certain financing, accounting, and auditing of  
 10 the Commission; providing, under certain circumstances, for certain immunity,  
 11 defense, and indemnity for certain individuals representing the Commission;  
 12 requiring the Commission to provide for the development, maintenance, and  
 13 utilization of a certain database and reporting system; requiring a member state to  
 14 submit certain data to a certain data system; establishing requirements for the  
 15 availability, notification, and removal of certain information from a certain data  
 16 system under certain circumstances; establishing the rulemaking powers and  
 17 procedures of the Commission; establishing procedures for oversight, dispute  
 18 resolution, and enforcement of the Compact by the Commission; providing for the  
 19 application of the Compact; establishing that certain states that join the Compact  
 20 are subject to certain rules; establishing certain procedures for a member state to  
 21 withdraw from the Compact; authorizing member states to amend the Compact  
 22 under certain circumstances; providing for the construction and severability of this  
 23 Act; making this Act subject to a certain contingency; requiring the Maryland  
 24 Department of Health to track certain legislation and notify the Department of  
 25 Legislative Services of a certain occurrence within a certain period of time; defining  
 26 certain terms; and generally relating to the Audiology and Speech–Language  
 27 Pathology Interstate Compact.

34 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,

35 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

36 **Article – Health Occupations**

37 **SUBTITLE 3A. AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY INTERSTATE**  
 38 **COMPACT.**

39 **2–3A–01.**

40 **THE AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY INTERSTATE**  
 41 **COMPACT IS ENACTED INTO LAW AND ENTERED INTO WITH ALL OTHER STATES**

1 LEGALLY JOINING IN IT IN THE FORM SUBSTANTIALLY AS IT APPEARS IN THIS  
2 SECTION AS FOLLOWS:

3           **SECTION 1. PURPOSE**

4           **THE PURPOSE OF THIS COMPACT IS TO FACILITATE INTERSTATE PRACTICE**  
5 **OF AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY WITH THE GOAL OF**  
6 **IMPROVING PUBLIC ACCESS TO AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY**  
7 **SERVICES. THE PRACTICE OF AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY**  
8 **OCCURS IN THE STATE WHERE THE PATIENT IS LOCATED AT THE TIME OF THE**  
9 **PATIENT ENCOUNTER. THE COMPACT PRESERVES THE REGULATORY AUTHORITY**  
10 **OF STATES TO PROTECT PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY THROUGH THE CURRENT**  
11 **SYSTEM OF STATE LICENSURE. THIS COMPACT IS DESIGNED TO ACHIEVE THE**  
12 **FOLLOWING OBJECTIVES:**

13           **(1) INCREASE PUBLIC ACCESS TO AUDIOLOGY AND**  
14 **SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY SERVICES BY PROVIDING FOR THE MUTUAL**  
15 **RECOGNITION OF OTHER MEMBER STATE LICENSES;**

16           **(2) ENHANCE THE ABILITY OF STATES TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC’S**  
17 **HEALTH AND SAFETY;**

18           **(3) ENCOURAGE THE COOPERATION OF MEMBER STATES IN**  
19 **REGULATING MULTISTATE AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY**  
20 **PRACTICE;**

21           **(4) SUPPORT SPOUSES OF RELOCATING ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY**  
22 **PERSONNEL;**

23           **(5) ENHANCE THE EXCHANGE OF LICENSURE, INVESTIGATIVE, AND**  
24 **DISCIPLINARY INFORMATION AMONG MEMBER STATES;**

25           **(6) ALLOW A REMOTE STATE TO HOLD A PROVIDER OF SERVICES**  
26 **WITH A COMPACT PRIVILEGE IN THAT STATE ACCOUNTABLE TO THE PRACTICE**  
27 **STANDARDS OF THAT STATE; AND**

28           **(7) ALLOW FOR THE USE OF TELEHEALTH TECHNOLOGY TO**  
29 **FACILITATE INCREASED ACCESS TO AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE**  
30 **PATHOLOGY SERVICES.**

31           **SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS**

32           **AS USED IN THIS COMPACT, AND EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE PROVIDED, THE**  
33 **FOLLOWING DEFINITIONS SHALL APPLY:**

1 (A) "ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY" MEANS FULL-TIME DUTY STATUS IN THE  
2 ACTIVE UNIFORMED SERVICE OF THE UNITED STATES, INCLUDING MEMBERS OF  
3 THE NATIONAL GUARD AND RESERVE ON ACTIVE DUTY ORDERS IN ACCORDANCE  
4 WITH 10 U.S.C. §§ 1209 AND 1211.

5 (B) "ADVERSE ACTION" MEANS ANY ADMINISTRATIVE, CIVIL, EQUITABLE,  
6 OR CRIMINAL ACTION AUTHORIZED BY A STATE'S LAWS THAT IS IMPOSED BY A  
7 LICENSING BOARD OR OTHER AUTHORITY AGAINST AN AUDIOLOGIST OR  
8 A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST, INCLUDING ACTIONS AGAINST AN  
9 INDIVIDUAL'S LICENSE OR PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE SUCH AS REVOCATION,  
10 SUSPENSION, PROBATION, MONITORING OF THE LICENSEE, OR RESTRICTION ON  
11 THE LICENSEE'S PRACTICE.

12 (C) "ALTERNATIVE PROGRAM" MEANS A NONDISCIPLINARY MONITORING  
13 PROCESS APPROVED BY AN AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY  
14 LICENSING BOARD TO ADDRESS IMPAIRED PRACTITIONERS.

15 (D) "AUDIOLOGIST" MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL WHO IS LICENSED BY A STATE  
16 TO PRACTICE AUDIOLOGY.

17 (E) "AUDIOLOGY" MEANS THE CARE AND SERVICES PROVIDED BY A  
18 LICENSED AUDIOLOGIST AS SET FORTH IN THE MEMBER STATE'S STATUTES AND  
19 RULES.

20 (F) "AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY COMPACT  
21 COMMISSION" OR "COMMISSION" MEANS THE NATIONAL ADMINISTRATIVE BODY  
22 ESTABLISHED UNDER SECTION 8 WHOSE MEMBERSHIP CONSISTS OF ALL STATES  
23 THAT HAVE ENACTED THE COMPACT.

24 (G) "AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY LICENSING BOARD",  
25 "AUDIOLOGY LICENSING BOARD", "SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY LICENSING  
26 BOARD", OR "LICENSING BOARD" MEANS THE AGENCY OF A STATE THAT IS  
27 RESPONSIBLE FOR THE LICENSING AND REGULATION OF AUDIOLOGISTS OR  
28 SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGISTS.

29 (H) "COMPACT PRIVILEGE" MEANS THE AUTHORIZATION GRANTED BY A  
30 REMOTE STATE TO ALLOW A LICENSEE FROM ANOTHER MEMBER STATE TO  
31 PRACTICE AS AN AUDIOLOGIST OR A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST IN THE  
32 REMOTE STATE UNDER ITS LAWS AND RULES. THE PRACTICE OF AUDIOLOGY OR  
33 SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY OCCURS IN THE MEMBER STATE WHERE THE  
34 PATIENT IS LOCATED AT THE TIME OF THE PATIENT ENCOUNTER.

1 (I) "CURRENT SIGNIFICANT INVESTIGATIVE INFORMATION" MEANS  
2 INVESTIGATIVE INFORMATION THAT A LICENSING BOARD, AFTER AN INQUIRY OR  
3 INVESTIGATION THAT INCLUDES NOTIFICATION AND AN OPPORTUNITY FOR THE  
4 AUDIOLOGIST OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST TO RESPOND, IF REQUIRED BY  
5 STATE LAW, HAS REASON TO BELIEVE IS NOT GROUNDLESS AND, IF PROVED TRUE,  
6 WOULD INDICATE MORE THAN A MINOR INFRACTION.

7 (J) "DATA SYSTEM" MEANS A REPOSITORY OF INFORMATION ABOUT  
8 LICENSEES ESTABLISHED UNDER SECTION 9, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO,  
9 CONTINUING EDUCATION, EXAMINATION, LICENSURE, INVESTIGATIVE, COMPACT  
10 PRIVILEGE, AND ADVERSE ACTION.

11 (K) "ENCUMBERED LICENSE" MEANS A LICENSE IN WHICH AN ADVERSE  
12 ACTION RESTRICTS THE PRACTICE OF AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE  
13 PATHOLOGY BY THE LICENSEE AND SAID ADVERSE ACTION HAS BEEN REPORTED TO  
14 THE NATIONAL PRACTITIONERS DATA BANK.

15 (L) "EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE" MEANS A GROUP OF DIRECTORS ELECTED  
16 OR APPOINTED TO ACT ON BEHALF OF, AND WITHIN THE POWERS GRANTED TO THEM  
17 BY, THE COMMISSION.

18 (M) "HOME STATE" MEANS THE MEMBER STATE THAT IS THE LICENSEE'S  
19 PRIMARY STATE OF RESIDENCE.

20 (N) "IMPAIRED PRACTITIONER" MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL WHOSE  
21 PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE IS ADVERSELY AFFECTED BY SUBSTANCE ABUSE,  
22 ADDICTION, OR OTHER HEALTH-RELATED CONDITIONS.

23 (O) "LICENSEE" MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL WHO CURRENTLY HOLDS AN  
24 AUTHORIZATION FROM A STATE LICENSING BOARD TO PRACTICE AS AN  
25 AUDIOLOGIST OR A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST.

26 (P) "MEMBER STATE" MEANS A STATE THAT HAS ENACTED THE COMPACT.

27 (Q) "PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE" MEANS A LEGAL AUTHORIZATION  
28 AUTHORIZING THE PRACTICE OF AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY  
29 IN A REMOTE STATE.

30 (R) "REMOTE STATE" MEANS A MEMBER STATE OTHER THAN THE HOME  
31 STATE WHERE A LICENSEE IS EXERCISING OR SEEKING TO EXERCISE THE COMPACT  
32 PRIVILEGE.

33 (S) "RULE" MEANS A REGULATION, PRINCIPLE, OR DIRECTIVE ADOPTED BY  
34 THE COMMISSION THAT HAS THE FORCE OF LAW.

1 (T) "SINGLE-STATE LICENSE" MEANS AN AUDIOLOGY OR  
2 SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY LICENSE ISSUED BY A MEMBER STATE THAT  
3 AUTHORIZES PRACTICE ONLY WITHIN THE ISSUING STATE AND DOES NOT INCLUDE  
4 A PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE IN ANY OTHER MEMBER STATE.

5 (U) "SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST" MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL WHO IS  
6 LICENSED BY A STATE TO PRACTICE SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY.

7 (V) "SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY" MEANS THE CARE AND SERVICES  
8 PROVIDED BY A LICENSED SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST AS SET FORTH IN THE  
9 MEMBER STATE'S STATUTES AND RULES.

10 (W) "STATE" MEANS ANY STATE, COMMONWEALTH, DISTRICT, OR  
11 TERRITORY OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA THAT REGULATES THE PRACTICE  
12 OF AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY.

13 (X) "STATE PRACTICE LAWS" MEANS THE LAWS, RULES, AND REGULATIONS  
14 OF A MEMBER STATE THAT GOVERN THE PRACTICE OF AUDIOLOGY OR  
15 SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY, DEFINE THE SCOPE OF AUDIOLOGY OR  
16 SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY PRACTICE, AND CREATE THE METHODS AND  
17 GROUNDS FOR IMPOSING DISCIPLINE.

18 (Y) "TELEHEALTH" MEANS THE APPLICATION OF ~~ELECTRONIC~~  
19 TELECOMMUNICATION, AUDIO-VISUAL, OR OTHER INFORMATION ~~TECHNOLOGY~~  
20 TECHNOLOGIES THAT MEETS THE APPLICABLE STANDARD OF CARE TO DELIVER  
21 AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY SERVICES OR INFORMATION AT A  
22 DISTANCE FOR ASSESSMENT, INTERVENTION, OR CONSULTATION.

### 23 SECTION 3. STATE PARTICIPATION IN THE COMPACT

24 (A) A LICENSE ISSUED TO AN AUDIOLOGIST OR A SPEECH-LANGUAGE  
25 PATHOLOGIST BY A HOME STATE TO A RESIDENT IN THAT STATE SHALL BE  
26 RECOGNIZED BY EACH MEMBER STATE AS AUTHORIZING AN AUDIOLOGIST OR  
27 A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST TO PRACTICE AUDIOLOGY OR  
28 SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY, UNDER A PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE, IN EACH  
29 MEMBER STATE WHERE THE LICENSEE OBTAINS SUCH A PRIVILEGE.

30 (B) (1) A STATE MUST IMPLEMENT OR USE PROCEDURES FOR  
31 CONSIDERING THE CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORDS OF APPLICANTS FOR INITIAL  
32 PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE. THESE PROCEDURES SHALL INCLUDE THE SUBMISSION  
33 OF FINGERPRINTS OR OTHER BIOMETRIC-BASED INFORMATION BY APPLICANTS  
34 FOR THE PURPOSE OF OBTAINING AN APPLICANT'S CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD

1 INFORMATION FROM THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION AND THE AGENCY  
2 RESPONSIBLE FOR RETAINING THAT STATE'S CRIMINAL RECORDS.

3 (2) A MEMBER STATE MUST FULLY IMPLEMENT A CRIMINAL  
4 BACKGROUND CHECK REQUIREMENT, WITHIN A TIME FRAME ESTABLISHED BY  
5 RULE, BY RECEIVING THE RESULTS OF THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION  
6 RECORD SEARCH ON CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECKS AND USE THE RESULTS IN  
7 MAKING LICENSURE DECISIONS.

8 (3) COMMUNICATION BETWEEN A MEMBER STATE AND THE  
9 COMMISSION, AND AMONG MEMBER STATES REGARDING THE VERIFICATION OF  
10 ELIGIBILITY FOR LICENSURE THROUGH THE COMPACT MAY NOT INCLUDE ANY  
11 INFORMATION RECEIVED FROM THE FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION  
12 RELATING TO A FEDERAL CRIMINAL RECORDS CHECK PERFORMED BY A MEMBER  
13 STATE UNDER PUBLIC LAW 92-544.

14 (C) ON APPLICATION FOR A PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE, THE LICENSING  
15 BOARD IN THE ISSUING REMOTE STATE SHALL ASCERTAIN, THROUGH THE DATA  
16 SYSTEM, WHETHER THE APPLICANT HAS EVER HELD, OR IS THE HOLDER OF, A  
17 LICENSE ISSUED BY ANY OTHER STATE, WHETHER THERE ARE ANY ENCUMBRANCES  
18 ON ANY LICENSE OR PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE HELD BY THE APPLICANT, AND  
19 WHETHER ANY ADVERSE ACTION HAS BEEN TAKEN AGAINST ANY LICENSE OR  
20 PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE HELD BY THE APPLICANT.

21 (D) EACH MEMBER STATE SHALL REQUIRE AN APPLICANT TO OBTAIN OR  
22 RETAIN A LICENSE IN THE HOME STATE AND MEET THE HOME STATE'S  
23 QUALIFICATIONS FOR LICENSURE OR RENEWAL OF LICENSURE, AS WELL AS ALL  
24 OTHER APPLICABLE STATE LAWS.

25 (E) AN AUDIOLOGIST MUST:

26 (1) MEET ONE OF THE FOLLOWING EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS:

27 (I) ON OR BEFORE DECEMBER 31, 2007, HAVE GRADUATED  
28 WITH A MASTER'S DEGREE OR DOCTORATE IN AUDIOLOGY, OR EQUIVALENT DEGREE  
29 REGARDLESS OF DEGREE NAME, FROM A PROGRAM THAT IS ACCREDITED BY AN  
30 ACCREDITING AGENCY RECOGNIZED BY THE COUNCIL FOR HIGHER EDUCATION  
31 ACCREDITATION, OR ITS SUCCESSOR, OR BY THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF  
32 EDUCATION AND OPERATED BY A COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY ACCREDITED BY A  
33 REGIONAL OR NATIONAL ACCREDITING ORGANIZATION RECOGNIZED BY A STATE  
34 LICENSING BOARD;

35 (II) ON OR AFTER JANUARY 1, 2008, HAVE GRADUATED WITH A  
36 DOCTORAL DEGREE IN AUDIOLOGY, OR EQUIVALENT DEGREE, REGARDLESS OF

1 DEGREE NAME, FROM A PROGRAM THAT IS ACCREDITED BY AN ACCREDITING  
2 AGENCY RECOGNIZED BY THE COUNCIL FOR HIGHER EDUCATION ACCREDITATION,  
3 OR ITS SUCCESSOR, OR BY THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND  
4 OPERATED BY A COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY ACCREDITED BY A REGIONAL OR  
5 NATIONAL ACCREDITING ORGANIZATION RECOGNIZED BY A STATE LICENSING  
6 BOARD; OR

7 (III) HAVE GRADUATED FROM AN AUDIOLOGY PROGRAM THAT IS  
8 HOUSED IN AN INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION OUTSIDE THE UNITED STATES:

9 1. FOR WHICH THE PROGRAM AND INSTITUTION HAVE  
10 BEEN APPROVED BY THE AUTHORIZED ACCREDITING BODY IN THE APPLICABLE  
11 COUNTRY; AND

12 2. WHOSE DEGREE PROGRAM HAS BEEN VERIFIED BY AN  
13 INDEPENDENT CREDENTIALS REVIEW AGENCY TO BE COMPARABLE TO A STATE  
14 LICENSING BOARD-APPROVED PROGRAM;

15 (2) HAVE COMPLETED A SUPERVISED CLINICAL PRACTICUM  
16 EXPERIENCE FROM AN ACCREDITED EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION OR ITS  
17 COOPERATING PROGRAMS AS REQUIRED BY ~~A LICENSING BOARD~~ THE COMMISSION;

18 (3) HAVE SUCCESSFULLY PASSED A NATIONAL EXAMINATION  
19 APPROVED BY THE COMMISSION;

20 (4) HOLD AN ACTIVE, UNENCUMBERED LICENSE;

21 (5) HAVE NOT BEEN CONVICTED OR FOUND GUILTY OF, AND HAVE  
22 NOT ENTERED INTO AN AGREED DISPOSITION REGARDING, A FELONY RELATED TO  
23 THE PRACTICE OF AUDIOLOGY, UNDER APPLICABLE STATE OR FEDERAL CRIMINAL  
24 LAW; AND

25 (6) HAVE A VALID UNITED STATES SOCIAL SECURITY OR NATIONAL  
26 PRACTITIONER IDENTIFICATION NUMBER.

27 (F) A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST MUST:

28 (1) MEET ONE OF THE FOLLOWING EDUCATIONAL REQUIREMENTS:

29 (I) HAVE GRADUATED WITH A MASTER'S DEGREE FROM A

33 NATIONAL ACCREDITING ORGANIZATION RECOGNIZED BY A LICENSING BOARD; OR



1 (II) HAVE GRADUATED FROM A SPEECH–LANGUAGE  
2 PATHOLOGY PROGRAM THAT IS HOUSED IN AN INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION  
3 OUTSIDE THE UNITED STATES:

4 1. FOR WHICH THE PROGRAM AND INSTITUTION HAVE  
5 BEEN APPROVED BY THE AUTHORIZED ACCREDITING BODY IN THE APPLICABLE

7 2. WHOSE DEGREE PROGRAM HAS BEEN VERIFIED BY AN  
8 INDEPENDENT CREDENTIALS REVIEW AGENCY TO BE COMPARABLE TO A STATE

10 (2) HAVE COMPLETED A SUPERVISED CLINICAL PRACTICUM  
11 EXPERIENCE FROM AN EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION OR ITS COOPERATING  
12 PROGRAMS AS REQUIRED BY THE COMMISSION;

13 (3) HAVE COMPLETED A SUPERVISED POSTGRADUATE  
14 PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE AS REQUIRED BY THE COMMISSION;

15 (4) HAVE SUCCESSFULLY PASSED A NATIONAL EXAMINATION  
16 APPROVED BY THE COMMISSION;

17 (5) HOLD AN ACTIVE, UNENCUMBERED LICENSE;

18 (6) HAVE NOT BEEN CONVICTED OR FOUND GUILTY OF, AND HAVE  
19 NOT ENTERED INTO AN AGREED DISPOSITION REGARDING, A FELONY RELATED TO  
20 THE PRACTICE OF SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY, UNDER APPLICABLE STATE OR  
21 FEDERAL CRIMINAL LAW; AND

22 (7) HAVE A VALID UNITED STATES SOCIAL SECURITY OR NATIONAL  
23 PRACTITIONER IDENTIFICATION NUMBER.

24 (G) THE PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE IS DERIVED FROM THE HOME STATE  
25 LICENSE.

26 (H) AN AUDIOLOGIST OR A SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST PRACTICING  
27 IN A MEMBER STATE MUST COMPLY WITH THE STATE PRACTICE LAWS OF THE STATE  
28 IN WHICH THE PATIENT IS LOCATED AT THE TIME SERVICE IS PROVIDED. THE  
29 PRACTICE OF AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY SHALL INCLUDE  
30 ALL AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY PRACTICE AS DEFINED BY  
31 THE STATE PRACTICE LAWS OF THE MEMBER STATE IN WHICH THE PATIENT IS  
32 LOCATED. THE PRACTICE OF AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH–LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY IN  
33 A MEMBER STATE UNDER A PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE SHALL SUBJECT AN

1 AUDIOLOGIST OR A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST TO THE JURISDICTION OF  
2 THE LICENSING BOARD, THE COURTS, AND THE LAWS OF THE MEMBER STATE IN

12 (J) MEMBER STATES MAY CHARGE A FEE FOR GRANTING A COMPACT  
13 PRIVILEGE.

14 (K) MEMBER STATES MUST COMPLY WITH THE BYLAWS AND RULES AND  
15 REGULATIONS OF THE COMMISSION.

#### 16 SECTION 4. COMPACT PRIVILEGE

17 (A) TO EXERCISE THE COMPACT PRIVILEGE UNDER THE TERMS AND  
18 PROVISIONS OF THE COMPACT, THE AUDIOLOGIST OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE  
19 PATHOLOGIST SHALL:

20 (1) HOLD AN ACTIVE LICENSE IN THE HOME STATE;

21 (2) HAVE NO ENCUMBRANCE ON ANY STATE LICENSE;

22 (3) BE ELIGIBLE FOR A COMPACT PRIVILEGE IN ANY MEMBER STATE  
23 IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 3;

24 (4) HAVE NOT HAD ANY ADVERSE ACTION AGAINST ANY LICENSE OR  
25 COMPACT PRIVILEGE WITHIN THE PREVIOUS 2 YEARS FROM DATE OF APPLICATION;

26 (5) NOTIFY THE COMMISSION THAT THE LICENSEE IS SEEKING THE  
27 COMPACT PRIVILEGE WITHIN A REMOTE STATE;

28 (6) PAY ANY APPLICABLE FEES, INCLUDING ANY STATE FEE, FOR THE  
29 COMPACT PRIVILEGE; AND

30 (7) REPORT TO THE COMMISSION ADVERSE ACTION TAKEN BY ANY  
31 NONMEMBER STATE WITHIN 30 DAYS FROM THE DATE THE ADVERSE ACTION IS  
32 TAKEN.

1           **(B) FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE COMPACT PRIVILEGE, AN AUDIOLOGIST OR**  
2 **A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST MAY HOLD ONLY ONE HOME STATE LICENSE AT**  
3 **A TIME.**

4           **(C) EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SECTION 6, IF AN AUDIOLOGIST OR**  
5 **A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST CHANGES PRIMARY STATE OF RESIDENCE BY**  
6 **MOVING BETWEEN TWO MEMBER STATES, THE AUDIOLOGIST OR**  
7 **SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST MUST APPLY FOR LICENSURE IN THE NEW HOME**  
8 **STATE, AND THE LICENSE ISSUED BY THE PRIOR HOME STATE SHALL BE**  
9 **DEACTIVATED IN ACCORDANCE WITH APPLICABLE RULES ADOPTED BY THE**  
10 **COMMISSION.**

11           **(D) THE AUDIOLOGIST OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST MAY APPLY**  
12 **FOR LICENSURE IN ADVANCE OF A CHANGE IN PRIMARY STATE OF RESIDENCE.**

13           **(E) A LICENSE MAY NOT BE ISSUED BY THE NEW HOME STATE UNTIL THE**  
14 **AUDIOLOGIST OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST PROVIDES SATISFACTORY**  
15 **EVIDENCE OF A CHANGE IN PRIMARY STATE OF RESIDENCE TO THE NEW HOME**  
16 **STATE AND SATISFIES ALL APPLICABLE REQUIREMENTS TO OBTAIN A LICENSE**  
17 **FROM THE NEW HOME STATE.**

18           **(F) IF AN AUDIOLOGIST OR A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST CHANGES**  
19 **PRIMARY STATE OF RESIDENCE BY MOVING FROM A MEMBER STATE TO A**  
20 **NONMEMBER STATE, THE LICENSE ISSUED BY THE PRIOR HOME STATE SHALL**  
21 **CONVERT TO A SINGLE-STATE LICENSE, VALID ONLY IN THE FORMER HOME STATE,**  
22 **AND THE COMPACT PRIVILEGE IN ANY MEMBER STATE IS DEACTIVATED IN**  
23 **ACCORDANCE WITH RULES ADOPTED BY THE COMMISSION.**

24           **(G) THE COMPACT PRIVILEGE IS VALID UNTIL THE EXPIRATION DATE OF**  
25 **THE HOME STATE LICENSE. THE LICENSEE MUST COMPLY WITH THE**  
26 **REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION TO MAINTAIN THE COMPACT**  
27 **PRIVILEGE IN THE REMOTE STATE.**

28           **(H) A LICENSEE PROVIDING AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE**  
29 **PATHOLOGY SERVICES IN A REMOTE STATE UNDER THE COMPACT PRIVILEGE SHALL**  
30 **FUNCTION WITHIN THE LAWS AND REGULATIONS OF THE REMOTE STATE.**

31           **(I) A LICENSEE PROVIDING AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE**  
32 **PATHOLOGY SERVICES IN A REMOTE STATE IS SUBJECT TO THE REGULATORY**  
33 **AUTHORITY OF THAT STATE. A REMOTE STATE MAY, IN ACCORDANCE WITH DUE**  
34 **PROCESS AND THE LAWS OF THAT STATE, REMOVE A LICENSEE'S COMPACT**  
35 **PRIVILEGE IN THE REMOTE STATE FOR A SPECIFIC PERIOD OF TIME, IMPOSE FINES,**

1 OR TAKE ANY OTHER NECESSARY ACTIONS TO PROTECT THE HEALTH AND SAFETY  
2 OF ITS CITIZENS.

3 (J) IF A HOME STATE LICENSE IS ENCUMBERED, THE LICENSEE SHALL LOSE  
4 THE COMPACT PRIVILEGE IN ANY REMOTE STATE UNTIL THE FOLLOWING OCCUR:

5 (1) THE HOME STATE LICENSE IS NO LONGER ENCUMBERED; AND

6 (2) 2 YEARS HAVE ELAPSED FROM THE DATE OF THE ADVERSE  
7 ACTION.

8 (K) ONCE AN ENCUMBERED LICENSE IN THE HOME STATE IS RESTORED TO  
9 GOOD STANDING, THE LICENSEE MUST MEET THE REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTION  
10 (A) OF THIS SECTION TO OBTAIN A COMPACT PRIVILEGE IN ANY REMOTE STATE.

11 (L) ONCE THE REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTION (J) OF THIS SECTION HAVE  
12 BEEN MET, THE LICENSEE MUST MEET THE REQUIREMENTS IN SUBSECTION (A) OF  
13 THIS SECTION TO OBTAIN A COMPACT PRIVILEGE IN A REMOTE STATE.

#### 14 SECTION 5. COMPACT PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE TELEHEALTH

15 (A) MEMBER STATES SHALL RECOGNIZE THE RIGHT OF AN AUDIOLOGIST OR  
16 A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST, LICENSED BY A HOME STATE IN ACCORDANCE  
17 WITH SECTION 3 AND UNDER RULES PROMULGATED BY THE COMMISSION, TO  
18 PRACTICE AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY IN ANY MEMBER STATE  
19 VIA TELEHEALTH UNDER A PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE AS PROVIDED IN THE COMPACT  
20 AND RULES PROMULGATED BY THE COMMISSION.

21 (B) A LICENSEE PROVIDING AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE  
22 PATHOLOGY SERVICES IN A REMOTE STATE UNDER THE COMPACT PRIVILEGE SHALL  
23 FUNCTION WITHIN THE LAWS AND REGULATIONS OF THE REMOTE STATE.

#### 24 SECTION 6. ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY PERSONNEL OR THEIR 25 SPOUSES

26 ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY PERSONNEL, OR THEIR SPOUSES, SHALL DESIGNATE  
27 A HOME STATE WHERE THE INDIVIDUAL HAS A CURRENT LICENSE IN GOOD  
28 STANDING. THE INDIVIDUAL MAY RETAIN THE HOME STATE DESIGNATION DURING  
29 THE PERIOD THE SERVICE MEMBER IS ON ACTIVE DUTY. SUBSEQUENT TO  
30 DESIGNATING A HOME STATE, THE INDIVIDUAL ~~MAY~~ SHALL CHANGE THE HOME  
31 STATE OF THE INDIVIDUAL ONLY THROUGH APPLICATION FOR LICENSURE IN THE  
32 NEW STATE.

#### 33 SECTION 7. ADVERSE ACTIONS

1           (A) (1) IN ADDITION TO THE OTHER POWERS CONFERRED BY STATE LAW,  
2 A REMOTE STATE SHALL HAVE THE AUTHORITY, IN ACCORDANCE WITH EXISTING  
3 STATE DUE PROCESS LAW, TO:

4                   (I) TAKE ADVERSE ACTION AGAINST AN AUDIOLOGIST'S OR A  
5 SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST'S PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE WITHIN THAT  
6 MEMBER STATE; AND

7                   (II) ISSUE SUBPOENAS FOR BOTH HEARINGS AND  
8 INVESTIGATIONS THAT REQUIRE THE ATTENDANCE AND TESTIMONY OF WITNESSES  
9 AS WELL AS THE PRODUCTION OF EVIDENCE.

10           (2) SUBPOENAS ISSUED BY A LICENSING BOARD IN A MEMBER STATE  
11 FOR THE ATTENDANCE AND TESTIMONY OF WITNESSES OR THE PRODUCTION OF  
12 EVIDENCE FROM ANOTHER MEMBER STATE SHALL BE ENFORCED IN THE LATTER  
13 STATE BY ANY COURT OF COMPETENT JURISDICTION, ACCORDING TO THE PRACTICE  
14 AND PROCEDURE OF THAT COURT APPLICABLE TO SUBPOENAS ISSUED IN  
15 PROCEEDINGS PENDING BEFORE IT. THE ISSUING AUTHORITY SHALL PAY ANY  
16 WITNESS FEES, TRAVEL EXPENSES, MILEAGE, AND OTHER FEES REQUIRED BY THE  
17 SERVICE STATUTES OF THE STATE IN WHICH THE WITNESSES OR EVIDENCE ARE  
18 LOCATED.

19           (3) ONLY THE HOME STATE SHALL HAVE THE POWER TO TAKE  
20 ADVERSE ACTION AGAINST AN AUDIOLOGIST'S OR A SPEECH-LANGUAGE  
21 PATHOLOGIST'S LICENSE ISSUED BY THE HOME STATE.

22           (B) FOR PURPOSES OF TAKING ADVERSE ACTION, THE HOME STATE SHALL  
23 GIVE THE SAME PRIORITY AND EFFECT TO REPORTED CONDUCT RECEIVED FROM A  
24 MEMBER STATE AS IT WOULD IF THE CONDUCT HAD OCCURRED WITHIN THE HOME  
25 STATE. IN SO DOING, THE HOME STATE SHALL APPLY ITS OWN STATE LAWS TO  
26 DETERMINE APPROPRIATE ACTION.

27           (C) THE HOME STATE SHALL COMPLETE ANY PENDING INVESTIGATIONS OF  
28 AN AUDIOLOGIST OR A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST WHO CHANGES PRIMARY  
29 STATE OF RESIDENCE DURING THE COURSE OF THE INVESTIGATIONS. THE HOME  
30 STATE SHALL ALSO HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO TAKE APPROPRIATE ACTION AND  
31 SHALL PROMPTLY REPORT THE CONCLUSIONS OF THE INVESTIGATIONS TO THE  
32 ADMINISTRATOR OF THE DATA SYSTEM. THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE DATA SYSTEM  
33 SHALL PROMPTLY NOTIFY THE NEW HOME STATE OF ANY ADVERSE ACTIONS.

34           (D) IF OTHERWISE AUTHORIZED BY STATE LAW, THE ~~HOME~~ MEMBER STATE  
35 MAY RECOVER FROM THE AFFECTED AUDIOLOGIST OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE  
36 PATHOLOGIST THE COSTS OF INVESTIGATIONS AND DISPOSITION OF CASES

1 RESULTING FROM ANY ADVERSE ACTION TAKEN AGAINST THAT AUDIOLOGIST OR  
2 SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST.

3 (E) ~~THE HOME MEMBER STATE SHALL~~ MAY TAKE ADVERSE ACTION BASED  
4 ON THE FACTUAL FINDINGS OF THE REMOTE STATE, PROVIDED THAT THE ~~HOME~~  
5 MEMBER STATE FOLLOWS ITS OWN PROCEDURES FOR TAKING THE ADVERSE  
6 ACTION.

7 (F) (1) IN ADDITION TO THE AUTHORITY GRANTED TO A MEMBER STATE  
8 BY ITS RESPECTIVE AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY PRACTICE ACT  
9 OR OTHER APPLICABLE STATE LAW, ANY MEMBER STATE MAY PARTICIPATE WITH  
10 OTHER MEMBER STATES IN JOINT INVESTIGATIONS OF LICENSEES.

11 (2) MEMBER STATES SHALL SHARE ANY INVESTIGATIVE, LITIGATION,  
12 OR COMPLIANCE MATERIALS IN FURTHERANCE OF ANY JOINT OR INDIVIDUAL  
13 INVESTIGATION INITIATED UNDER THE COMPACT.

14 (G) IF ADVERSE ACTION IS TAKEN BY THE HOME STATE AGAINST AN  
15 AUDIOLOGIST'S OR A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST'S LICENSE, THE  
16 AUDIOLOGIST'S OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST'S PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE IN  
17 ALL OTHER MEMBER STATES SHALL BE DEACTIVATED UNTIL ALL ENCUMBRANCES  
18 HAVE BEEN REMOVED FROM THE STATE LICENSE. ALL HOME STATE DISCIPLINARY  
19 ORDERS THAT IMPOSE ADVERSE ACTION AGAINST AN AUDIOLOGIST'S OR  
20 A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST'S LICENSE SHALL INCLUDE A STATEMENT  
21 THAT THE AUDIOLOGIST'S OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST'S PRIVILEGE TO  
22 PRACTICE IS DEACTIVATED IN ALL MEMBER STATES DURING THE PENDENCY OF THE  
23 ORDER.

24 (H) IF A MEMBER STATE TAKES ADVERSE ACTION AGAINST A LICENSEE, IT  
25 SHALL PROMPTLY NOTIFY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE DATA SYSTEM. THE  
26 ADMINISTRATOR OF THE DATA SYSTEM SHALL PROMPTLY NOTIFY THE HOME STATE,  
27 AND ANY REMOTE STATE IN WHICH THE LICENSEE HAS A PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE,  
28 OF ANY ADVERSE ACTIONS BY THE HOME STATE OR REMOTE STATES.

29 (I) NOTHING IN THIS COMPACT SHALL OVERRIDE A MEMBER STATE'S  
30 DECISION THAT PARTICIPATION IN AN ALTERNATIVE PROGRAM MAY BE USED IN  
31 LIEU OF ADVERSE ACTION.

32 SECTION 8. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE AUDIOLOGY AND  
33 SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY COMPACT COMMISSION

34 (A) (1) THE COMPACT MEMBER STATES HEREBY CREATE AND ESTABLISH  
35 A JOINT PUBLIC AGENCY KNOWN AS THE AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH-LANGUAGE  
36 PATHOLOGY COMPACT COMMISSION.

1           **(2) THE COMMISSION IS AN INSTRUMENTALITY OF THE COMPACT**  
2 **STATES.**

3           **(3) VENUE IS PROPER AND JUDICIAL PROCEEDINGS BY OR AGAINST**  
4 **THE COMMISSION SHALL BE BROUGHT SOLELY AND EXCLUSIVELY IN A COURT OF**  
5 **COMPETENT JURISDICTION WHERE THE PRINCIPAL OFFICE OF THE COMMISSION IS**  
6 **LOCATED. THE COMMISSION MAY WAIVE VENUE AND JURISDICTIONAL DEFENSES**  
7 **TO THE EXTENT IT ADOPTS OR CONSENTS TO PARTICIPATE IN ALTERNATIVE**  
8 **DISPUTE RESOLUTION PROCEEDINGS.**

9           **(4) NOTHING IN THIS COMPACT SHALL BE CONSTRUED TO BE A**  
10 **WAIVER OF SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY.**

11           **(B) (1) EACH MEMBER STATE SHALL HAVE TWO DELEGATES SELECTED**  
12 **BY THE LICENSING BOARD OF THAT MEMBER STATE. THE DELEGATES SHALL BE**  
13 **CURRENT MEMBERS OF THE LICENSING BOARD. ONE SHALL BE AN AUDIOLOGIST**  
14 **AND ONE SHALL BE A SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST.**

15           **(2) AN ADDITIONAL FIVE DELEGATES, WHO ARE EITHER PUBLIC**  
16 **MEMBERS OR BOARD ADMINISTRATORS FROM STATE LICENSING BOARDS, SHALL BE**  
17 **CHOSEN BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FROM A POOL OF NOMINEES PROVIDED BY**  
18 **THE COMMISSION AT LARGE.**

19           **(3) ANY DELEGATE MAY BE REMOVED OR SUSPENDED FROM OFFICE**  
20 **AS PROVIDED BY THE LAW OF THE STATE FROM WHICH THE DELEGATE IS**  
21 **APPOINTED.**

22           **(4) THE MEMBER STATE BOARD SHALL FILL ANY VACANCY**  
23 **OCCURRING ON THE COMMISSION WITHIN 90 DAYS.**

24           **(5) EACH DELEGATE SHALL BE ENTITLED TO ONE VOTE WITH**  
25 **REGARD TO THE PROMULGATION OF RULES AND CREATION OF BYLAWS AND SHALL**  
26 **OTHERWISE HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE BUSINESS AND**  
27 **AFFAIRS OF THE COMMISSION.**

28           **(6) A DELEGATE SHALL VOTE IN PERSON OR BY OTHER MEANS AS**  
29 **PROVIDED IN THE BYLAWS. THE BYLAWS MAY PROVIDE FOR THE PARTICIPATION OF**  
30 **THE DELEGATES IN MEETINGS BY TELEPHONE OR OTHER MEANS OF**  
31 **COMMUNICATION.**

32           **(7) THE COMMISSION SHALL MEET AT LEAST ONCE DURING EACH**  
33 **CALENDAR YEAR. ADDITIONAL MEETINGS SHALL BE HELD AS SET FORTH IN THE**  
34 **BYLAWS.**

- 1           **(C) THE COMMISSION SHALL HAVE THE FOLLOWING POWERS AND DUTIES:**
- 2           **(1) ESTABLISH THE FISCAL YEAR OF THE COMMISSION;**
- 3           **(2) ESTABLISH BYLAWS;**
- 4           **(3) ESTABLISH A CODE OF ETHICS;**

9 **ADMINISTRATION OF THIS COMPACT, AS DETERMINED BY THE RULES OF THE**  
10 **COMMISSION.**

12 **MEMBER STATE MAY BE AVAILABLE ONLY TO OTHER MEMBER STATES.**

21 **NOTICE TO THE COMMISSION OF THEIR INTENTION TO ATTEND THE PUBLIC**

24 **SHALL ALLOW PERSONS TO SUBMIT WRITTEN DATA, FACTS, OPINIONS, AND**  
25 **ARGUMENTS, WHICH SHALL BE MADE AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC.**

26           **(G) THE COMMISSION SHALL GRANT AN OPPORTUNITY FOR A PUBLIC**  
27 **HEARING BEFORE IT ADOPTS A RULE OR AMENDMENT IF A HEARING IS REQUESTED**  
28 **BY:**

29           **(1) AT LEAST 25 PERSONS;**

30           **(2) A STATE OR FEDERAL GOVERNMENTAL SUBDIVISION OR AGENCY;**

31 **OR**

1           **(3) AN ASSOCIATION HAVING AT LEAST 25 MEMBERS.**

2           **(H) (1) IF A HEARING IS HELD ON THE PROPOSED RULE OR AMENDMENT,**  
3 **THE COMMISSION SHALL PUBLISH THE PLACE, TIME, AND DATE OF THE SCHEDULED**  
4 **PUBLIC HEARING. IF THE HEARING IS HELD VIA ELECTRONIC MEANS, THE**  
5 **COMMISSION SHALL PUBLISH THE MECHANISM FOR ACCESSING THE ELECTRONIC**  
6 **HEARING.**

7           **(2) ALL PERSONS WISHING TO BE HEARD AT THE HEARING SHALL**  
8 **NOTIFY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE COMMISSION OR OTHER DESIGNATED**  
9 **MEMBER IN WRITING OF THEIR DESIRE TO APPEAR AND TESTIFY AT THE HEARING**  
10 **NOT LESS THAN 5 BUSINESS DAYS BEFORE THE SCHEDULED DATE OF THE HEARING.**

11           **(3) HEARINGS SHALL BE CONDUCTED IN A MANNER PROVIDING EACH**  
12 **PERSON WHO WISHES TO COMMENT A FAIR AND REASONABLE OPPORTUNITY TO**  
13 **COMMENT ORALLY OR IN WRITING.**

14           **(4) ALL HEARINGS SHALL BE RECORDED. A COPY OF THE RECORDING**  
15 **SHALL BE MADE AVAILABLE TO ANY PERSON ON REQUEST AND AT THE REQUESTING**  
16 **PERSON'S EXPENSE.**

17           **(5) NOTHING IN THIS SUBSECTION SHALL BE CONSTRUED AS**  
18 **REQUIRING A SEPARATE HEARING ON EACH RULE. RULES MAY BE GROUPED FOR**  
19 **THE CONVENIENCE OF THE COMMISSION AT HEARINGS REQUIRED BY THIS**  
20 **SUBSECTION.**

21           **(I) FOLLOWING THE SCHEDULED HEARING DATE, OR BY THE CLOSE OF**  
22 **BUSINESS ON THE SCHEDULED HEARING DATE IF THE HEARING WAS NOT HELD, THE**  
23 **COMMISSION SHALL CONSIDER ALL WRITTEN AND ORAL COMMENTS RECEIVED.**

24           **(J) IF NO WRITTEN NOTICE OF INTENT TO ATTEND THE PUBLIC HEARING BY**  
25 **INTERESTED PARTIES IS RECEIVED, THE COMMISSION MAY PROCEED WITH**  
26 **PROMULGATION OF THE PROPOSED RULE WITHOUT A PUBLIC HEARING.**

27           **(K) THE COMMISSION SHALL, BY MAJORITY VOTE OF ALL MEMBERS, TAKE**  
28 **FINAL ACTION ON THE PROPOSED RULE AND SHALL DETERMINE THE EFFECTIVE**  
29 **DATE OF THE RULE, IF ANY, BASED ON THE RULEMAKING RECORD AND THE FULL**  
30 **TEXT OF THE RULE.**

31           **(L) ON DETERMINATION THAT AN EMERGENCY EXISTS, THE COMMISSION**  
32 **MAY CONSIDER AND ADOPT AN EMERGENCY RULE WITHOUT PRIOR NOTICE,**  
33 **OPPORTUNITY FOR COMMENT, OR HEARING, PROVIDED THAT THE USUAL**  
34 **RULEMAKING PROCEDURES PROVIDED IN THE COMPACT AND IN THIS SECTION**



1 SHALL BE RETROACTIVELY APPLIED TO THE RULE AS SOON AS REASONABLY  
2 POSSIBLE, IN NO EVENT LATER THAN 90 DAYS AFTER THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THE  
3 RULE. FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS PROVISION, AN EMERGENCY RULE IS ONE THAT  
4 MUST BE ADOPTED IMMEDIATELY IN ORDER TO:

5 (1) MEET AN IMMINENT THREAT TO PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY, OR  
6 WELFARE;

7 (2) PREVENT A LOSS OF COMMISSION OR MEMBER STATE FUNDS; OR

8 (3) MEET A DEADLINE FOR THE PROMULGATION OF AN  
9 ADMINISTRATIVE RULE THAT IS ESTABLISHED BY FEDERAL LAW OR RULE.

10 (M) THE COMMISSION OR AN AUTHORIZED COMMITTEE OF THE  
11 COMMISSION MAY DIRECT REVISIONS TO A PREVIOUSLY ADOPTED RULE OR  
12 AMENDMENT FOR PURPOSES OF CORRECTING TYPOGRAPHICAL ERRORS, ERRORS IN  
13 FORMAT, ERRORS IN CONSISTENCY, OR GRAMMATICAL ERRORS. PUBLIC NOTICE OF  
14 ANY REVISIONS SHALL BE POSTED ON THE WEBSITE OF THE COMMISSION. THE  
15 REVISION SHALL BE SUBJECT TO CHALLENGE BY ANY PERSON FOR A PERIOD OF 30  
16 DAYS AFTER POSTING. THE REVISION MAY BE CHALLENGED ONLY ON GROUNDS  
17 THAT THE REVISION RESULTS IN A MATERIAL CHANGE TO A RULE. A CHALLENGE  
18 SHALL BE MADE IN WRITING AND DELIVERED TO THE CHAIR OF THE COMMISSION  
19 PRIOR TO THE END OF THE NOTICE PERIOD. IF NO CHALLENGE IS MADE, THE  
20 REVISION SHALL TAKE EFFECT WITHOUT FURTHER ACTION. IF THE REVISION IS  
21 CHALLENGED, THE REVISION MAY NOT TAKE EFFECT WITHOUT THE APPROVAL OF  
22 THE COMMISSION.

23 SECTION 11. OVERSIGHT, DISPUTE RESOLUTION, AND  
24 ENFORCEMENT

25 (A) (1) ON REQUEST BY A MEMBER STATE, THE COMMISSION SHALL  
26 ATTEMPT TO RESOLVE DISPUTES RELATED TO THE COMPACT THAT ARISE AMONG  
27 MEMBER STATES AND BETWEEN MEMBER AND NONMEMBER STATES.

28 (2) THE COMMISSION SHALL PROMULGATE A RULE PROVIDING FOR  
29 BOTH MEDIATION AND BINDING DISPUTE RESOLUTION FOR DISPUTES AS  
30 APPROPRIATE.

31 (B) (1) THE COMMISSION, IN THE REASONABLE EXERCISE OF ITS  
32 DISCRETION, SHALL ENFORCE THE PROVISIONS AND RULES OF THIS COMPACT.

33 (2) BY MAJORITY VOTE, THE COMMISSION MAY INITIATE LEGAL  
34 ACTION IN THE UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT FOR THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA  
35 OR THE FEDERAL DISTRICT WHERE THE COMMISSION HAS ITS PRINCIPAL OFFICES

1 AGAINST A MEMBER STATE IN DEFAULT TO ENFORCE COMPLIANCE WITH THE  
2 PROVISIONS OF THE COMPACT AND ITS PROMULGATED RULES AND BYLAWS. THE  
3 RELIEF SOUGHT MAY INCLUDE BOTH INJUNCTIVE RELIEF AND DAMAGES. IN THE  
4 EVENT JUDICIAL ENFORCEMENT IS NECESSARY, THE PREVAILING MEMBER SHALL  
5 BE AWARDED ALL COSTS OF LITIGATION, INCLUDING REASONABLE ATTORNEY'S  
6 FEES.

7 (3) THE REMEDIES HEREIN SHALL NOT BE THE EXCLUSIVE REMEDIES  
8 OF THE COMMISSION. THE COMMISSION MAY PURSUE ANY OTHER REMEDIES  
9 AVAILABLE UNDER FEDERAL OR STATE LAW.

10 SECTION 12. DATE OF IMPLEMENTATION OF THE AUDIOLOGY  
11 AND SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY INTERSTATE COMPACT AND  
12 ASSOCIATED RULES, WITHDRAWAL, AND AMENDMENT

13 (A) THE COMPACT SHALL COME INTO EFFECT ON THE DATE ON WHICH THE  
14 COMPACT STATUTE IS ENACTED INTO LAW IN THE 10TH MEMBER STATE. THE  
15 PROVISIONS, WHICH BECOME EFFECTIVE AT THAT TIME, SHALL BE LIMITED TO THE  
16 POWERS GRANTED TO THE COMMISSION RELATING TO ASSEMBLY AND THE  
17 PROMULGATION OF RULES. THEREAFTER, THE COMMISSION SHALL MEET AND  
18 EXERCISE RULEMAKING POWERS NECESSARY TO THE IMPLEMENTATION AND  
19 ADMINISTRATION OF THE COMPACT.

20 (B) ANY STATE THAT JOINS THE COMPACT SUBSEQUENT TO THE INITIAL  
21 ADOPTION OF THE RULES BY THE COMMISSION SHALL BE SUBJECT TO THE RULES  
22 AS THEY EXIST ON THE DATE ON WHICH THE COMPACT BECOMES LAW IN THAT  
23 STATE. ANY RULE THAT HAS BEEN PREVIOUSLY ADOPTED BY THE COMMISSION  
24 SHALL HAVE THE FULL FORCE AND EFFECT OF LAW ON THE DAY THE COMPACT  
25 BECOMES LAW IN THAT STATE.

26 (C) (1) ANY MEMBER STATE MAY WITHDRAW FROM THIS COMPACT BY  
27 ENACTING A STATUTE REPEALING THE SAME.

28 (2) A MEMBER STATE'S WITHDRAWAL SHALL NOT TAKE EFFECT  
29 UNTIL 6 MONTHS AFTER ENACTMENT OF THE REPEALING STATUTE.

30 (3) WITHDRAWAL SHALL NOT AFFECT THE CONTINUING  
31 REQUIREMENT OF THE WITHDRAWING STATE'S AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE  
32 PATHOLOGY LICENSING BOARD TO COMPLY WITH THE INVESTIGATIVE AND  
33 ADVERSE ACTION REPORTING REQUIREMENTS OF THIS ACT PRIOR TO THE  
34 EFFECTIVE DATE OF WITHDRAWAL.

35 (D) NOTHING CONTAINED IN THIS COMPACT SHALL BE CONSTRUED TO  
36 INVALIDATE OR PREVENT ANY AUDIOLOGY OR SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY

1 LICENSURE AGREEMENT OR OTHER COOPERATIVE ARRANGEMENT BETWEEN A  
2 MEMBER STATE AND A NONMEMBER STATE THAT DOES NOT CONFLICT WITH THE  
3 PROVISIONS OF THIS COMPACT.

4 (E) THIS COMPACT MAY BE AMENDED BY THE MEMBER STATES. NO  
5 AMENDMENT TO THIS COMPACT SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE AND BINDING ON ANY  
6 MEMBER STATE UNTIL IT IS ENACTED INTO THE LAWS OF ALL MEMBER STATES.

### 7 SECTION 13. CONSTRUCTION AND SEVERABILITY

8 THIS COMPACT SHALL BE LIBERALLY CONSTRUED SO AS TO EFFECTUATE THE  
9 PURPOSES THEREOF. THE PROVISIONS OF THIS COMPACT SHALL BE SEVERABLE  
10 AND IF ANY PHRASE, CLAUSE, SENTENCE, OR PROVISION OF THIS COMPACT IS  
11 DECLARED TO BE CONTRARY TO THE CONSTITUTION OF ANY MEMBER STATE OR OF  
12 THE UNITED STATES OR THE APPLICABILITY THEREOF TO ANY GOVERNMENT,  
13 AGENCY, PERSON, OR CIRCUMSTANCE IS HELD INVALID, THE VALIDITY OF THE  
14 REMAINDER OF THIS COMPACT AND THE APPLICABILITY THEREOF TO ANY  
15 GOVERNMENT, AGENCY, PERSON, OR CIRCUMSTANCE SHALL NOT BE AFFECTED  
16 THEREBY. IF THIS COMPACT SHALL BE HELD CONTRARY TO THE CONSTITUTION OF  
17 ANY MEMBER STATE, THE COMPACT SHALL REMAIN IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT AS  
18 TO THE REMAINING MEMBER STATES AND IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT AS TO THE  
19 MEMBER STATE AFFECTED AS TO ALL SEVERABLE MATTERS.

### 20 SECTION 14. BINDING EFFECT OF COMPACT AND OTHER LAWS

21 (A) NOTHING HEREIN PREVENTS THE ENFORCEMENT OF ANY OTHER LAW  
22 OF A MEMBER STATE THAT IS NOT INCONSISTENT WITH THE COMPACT.

23 (B) ALL LAWS IN A MEMBER STATE IN CONFLICT WITH THE COMPACT ARE  
24 SUPERSEDED TO THE EXTENT OF THE CONFLICT.

25 (C) ALL LAWFUL ACTIONS OF THE COMMISSION, INCLUDING ALL RULES  
26 AND BYLAWS PROMULGATED BY THE COMMISSION, ARE BINDING ON THE MEMBER  
27 STATES.

28 (D) ALL AGREEMENTS BETWEEN THE COMMISSION AND THE MEMBER  
29 STATES ARE BINDING IN ACCORDANCE WITH THEIR TERMS.

30 (E) IN THE EVENT ANY PROVISION OF THE COMPACT EXCEEDS THE  
31 CONSTITUTIONAL LIMITS IMPOSED ON THE LEGISLATURE OF ANY MEMBER STATE,  
32 THE PROVISION SHALL BE INEFFECTIVE TO THE EXTENT OF THE CONFLICT WITH  
33 THE CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISION IN QUESTION IN THAT MEMBER STATE.

1 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act is contingent on the  
2 enacting of substantially similar legislation in nine other states. The Maryland Department  
3 of Health shall notify the Department of Legislative Services within 10 days after nine  
4 states have enacted legislation that is substantially similar to this Act.

5 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, subject to Section 2 of this  
6 Act, this Act shall take effect October 1, 2021.
