2 **Public Service Commission – Cybersecurity Staffing and Assessments**
3 **(Critical Infrastructure Cybersecurity Act of 2023)**

4 FOR the purpose of requiring the Public Service Commission to include on its staff a certain
5 number of experts in cybersecurity to perform certain duties; requiring the
6 Commission to establish, in coordination with the Office of Security Management,
7 cybersecurity standards and best practices for regulated entities, share information
8 on cybersecurity initiatives and best practices with certain entities, ~~and conduct a~~
9 ~~certain periodic assessment~~ *collect certain certifications, and submit a certain report*;
10 requiring certain public service companies, including certain electric cooperatives, to
11 adopt and implement certain cybersecurity standards and a zero-trust cybersecurity
12 approach for certain services, establish certain minimum security standards, and
13 periodically ~~contract~~ *engage* with a third party to conduct a certain assessment and
14 submit certain information to the Commission beginning in a certain year; ~~requiring~~

4 (d) (1) The State budget shall provide sufficient money for the Commission to
 5 hire, develop, and organize a staff to perform the functions of the Commission, including
 6 analyzing data submitted to the Commission and participating in proceedings as provided
 7 in § 3-104 of this article.

8 (2) (i) As the Commission considers necessary, the Commission shall
 9 hire experts including economists, cost of capital experts, rate design experts, accountants,
 10 engineers, transportation specialists, and lawyers.

11 (ii) To assist in the regulation of intrastate hazardous liquid
 12 pipelines under Title 11, Subtitle 2 of this article, the Commission shall include on its staff
 13 at least one engineer who specializes in the storage of and the transportation of hazardous
 14 liquid materials by pipeline.

15 [(4)] (5) The lawyers who represent the Commission staff in proceedings
 16 before the Commission shall be appointed by the Commission and shall be organized and
 17 operate independently of the office of General Counsel.

18 [(5)] (6) (i) As required, the Commission shall hire public utility law
 19 judges.

20 (ii) Public utility law judges are a separate organizational unit and
 21 shall report directly to the Commission.

22 [(6)] (7) The Commission shall hire personal staff members for each
 23 commissioner as required to provide advice, draft proposed orders and rulings, and perform
 24 other personal staff functions.

A. THE NAME OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY;

B. THE DATE OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY’S MOST RECENT CYBERSECURITY ASSESSMENT;

C. THE CYBERSECURITY FRAMEWORK USED IN THE CYBERSECURITY ASSESSMENT OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY; AND

D. THE NAME OF THE ENTITY THAT COMPLETED THE CYBERSECURITY ASSESSMENT.

[(7) (9)] Subject to § 3–104 of this article, the Commission may delegate to a commissioner or personnel the authority to perform an administrative function necessary to carry out a duty of the Commission.

[(8) (10)] (i) Except as provided in subparagraph (ii) of this paragraph or otherwise by law, all personnel of the Commission are subject to the provisions of the State Personnel and Pensions Article.

(ii) The following are in the executive service, management service, or are special appointments in the State Personnel Management System:

1. each commissioner of the Commission;
2. the Executive Director;
3. the General Counsel and each assistant general counsel;
4. the Executive Secretary;
5. the commissioners’ personal staff members;
6. the chief public utility law judge; and
7. each license hearing officer.

(a) (1) The Commission shall:

(i) supervise and regulate the public service companies subject to the jurisdiction of the Commission to:

1 1. ensure their operation in the interest of the public; and

2 2. promote adequate, economical, and efficient delivery of

19 statewide greenhouse gas emissions, including those specified in Title 2, Subtitle 12 of the
20 Environment Article; AND

21 **(VII) THE PROTECTION OF A PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY'S**
22 **INFRASTRUCTURE AGAINST CYBERSECURITY THREATS.**

23 (b) The powers and duties listed in this title do not limit the scope of the general
24 powers and duties of the Commission provided for by this division.

26 **(A) IN THIS SECTION, "ZERO-TRUST" MEANS A CYBERSECURITY APPROACH:**

27 **(1) FOCUSED ON CYBERSECURITY RESOURCE PROTECTION; AND**

28 **(2) BASED ON THE PREMISE THAT TRUST IS NEVER GRANTED**
29 **IMPLICITLY BUT MUST BE CONTINUALLY EVALUATED.**

1 (B) THIS SECTION DOES NOT APPLY TO A PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY THAT

 2 THE DEPARTMENT OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY.

3 (2) THE STATE CHIEF INFORMATION SECURITY OFFICER, IN
 4 CONSULTATION WITH THE COMMISSION, SHALL ESTABLISH A PROCESS FOR A
 5 PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY TO REPORT CYBERSECURITY INCIDENTS UNDER
 6 PARAGRAPH (1) OF THIS SUBSECTION, INCLUDING ESTABLISHING:

22 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, ~~on or before October 1, 2024,~~
 23 ~~the Public Service Commission shall conduct an evaluation based on assessments~~
 24 ~~conducted on a public service company’s information technology devices conducted under~~
 25 ~~Section 1 of this Act~~ for fiscal year 2024, funds from the Dedicated Purpose Account may be
 26 transferred by budget amendment, in accordance with § 7–310 of the State Finance and
 27 Procurement Article, to the Department of Information Technology for the purpose of adding
 28 additional staffing and operational capacity for the Department to improve State and local
 29 cybersecurity.

30 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That it is the intent of the General
 31 Assembly that the Public Service Commission work with the Cybersecurity and
 32 Infrastructure Security Agency and the Office of Security Management to improve the
 33 Commission’s capacity to implement the provisions of this Act.
