Kennedy Krieger Institute supports House Bill 572 - Places of Public Accommodation and Public Buildings - Gender-Inclusive Signage

Bill Summary:

House Bill 572 requires single-occupancy public restrooms be marked with gender-inclusive signage that does not indicate a specific gender.

Background:

Kennedy Krieger Institute provides specialized services to patients nationally and internationally. Kennedy Krieger Institute is dedicated to improving the lives of children and young adults with developmental, behavioral, cognitive and physical challenges. Kennedy Krieger's services include inpatient, outpatient, school-based and community-based programs.

Rationale:

Approximately 20% of the US population is living with a disability. As a provider for individuals with disabilities, Kennedy Krieger feels strongly that all people deserve privacy and safety when using a public restroom. Gender inclusive bathrooms in public spaces are important for the patients, students, and families whom we serve at Kennedy Krieger Institute.

A single-occupancy public restroom is defined as fully enclosed, containing only one toilet, and may be locked by the user. Often, the user of the public restroom is an individual, child or adult, with one or more disability who requires caregiver(s), and/or Direct Service Provider(s) (DSP) to assist them with their toileting needs and to assure privacy by being able to lock the restroom door on behalf of the individual whom they are serving. In many instances, the caregiver or DSP is not the same gender as the person whom they are serving.

Additionally, gender-inclusive signage will create both a pictorial representation and descriptive language (such as "restroom", "bathroom", or "toilet"), which will be helpful to many individuals with disabilities.
