TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF HB 1043
Public Health – Pregnancy – Abortion Coercion
(Coercive Abuse Against Mothers Prevention Act)

HB 1043 prohibits a person from committing or threatening to commit coercive acts with the intent of leveraging a pregnant woman to have an abortion. It also provides that a pregnant minor is to be considered emancipated for the purposes of being eligible for public assistance in situations where they are without support from parent and/or legal guardians due to their refusal to voluntarily seek an abortion.

This bill further provides that facilities that perform abortions must post certain signage in certain rooms of the facility to be meant to re-inform that pregnant woman that they have choices and outreach programs available to them.

Abortion is often anything but a “choice.” Using coercive control, women are often subjugated to the desires of others including partners, parents, friends, or employers. The Daily Beast, has acknowledged that coercive abortions are a “twisted form of domestic abuse,” occurring more often than previously thought¹

Coercive abuse can take many forms and is intended to force a woman into “choosing” an abortion. Untold numbers of women have suffered including, by example:

- (1) Katelyn Kampf, a 19-year-old college student and former high school honor student, was bound and gagged by her parents, who disapproved of the child’s father, and forced into a car to make a trip from Maine to New York where they knew someone who would perform an abortion. Fortunately, Katelyn managed to escape when she convinced her parents to let her use the restroom in a store. Police later found a .22 caliber rifle, rope, and duct tape in the car.²
- (2) Sharrona Alexander, an assistant women’s basketball coach at the University of California at Berkeley, was told by her boss, Marianne Stanley, that she needed to have an abortion to keep her job. When Alexander refused, Stanley demanded her resignation.³
- (3) A 16-year-old Cleveland girl was beaten with a metal broomstick by her father who wanted her to get an abortion.⁴
- (4) A 16-year-old Georgia girl was forced by her mother and two cousins to drink turpentine in order induce an abortion.⁵
- (5) Shontrese Otrey was told by Emergency Shelters, Inc. of Richmond, Virginia that she would not be eligible for a room because she was pregnant. A staff member then drove her to the bank to withdraw money for an abortion and took her to the abortion clinic.⁶

Clearly, many women who arrive on the doorstep of an abortion clinic are not there of their own free “choice.” Instead, they are there because others are pressuring or forcing them to undergo the procedure. Hundreds of women have testified to the devastating effects of their coerced abortions.⁷

At least eighteen states currently have some form of coercive abuse prevention law: Arizona, Delaware, Idaho, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, and Wisconsin.

Research indicates that violence against pregnant women is a serious problem. Many women report that they were coerced into abortions and have suffered grievous physical, emotional, psychological, and spiritual harm as a result. Reproductive healthcare facilities are often the only and last opportunities of hope for victims of coercive abuse and, as such, are in a unique position to help these women. More cases of coerced attempted abortions are reported if women are informed of their rights and given information concerning treatment and protection options. Some women coerced into having abortions are in fact also victims of human trafficking.

Coercive abuse is a serious women’s health issue because it violates a woman’s rights to physical and emotional health, freedom of conscience and to freely choose either to continue her pregnancy or to have an abortion.

HB 1043 provides for the prohibition of actions intended to coerce or otherwise force a woman to abort her unborn child. More importantly empowers all mothers in the State of Maryland to exercise their freedom of choice in choosing life for their unborn child, free from violent and abusive coercion.
